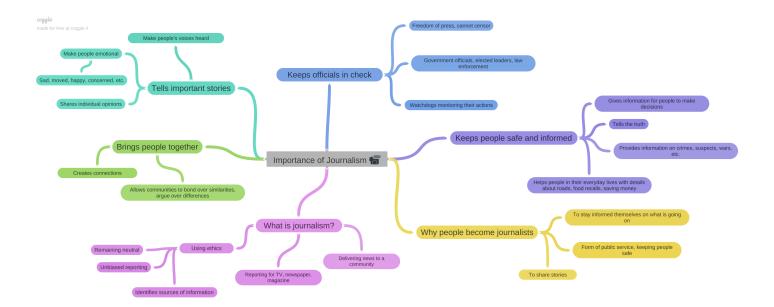
9. Tagline:
